With strong support and a clear vision, *The Factory* will grow into a place of culture, connection, and opportunity for all.

In July, SETAC hosted a lively community gathering at the Cannery, affectionately known as "The Factory" to locals. Guests enjoyed a documentary on the site's history, which highlighted its lasting impact on generations of local families. The film featured long-time worker Rodney Direen, who brought along original tools and shared decades of memories. The screening sparked excitement as many attendees spotted relatives on the big screen and swapped stories of their own.

What's Happening on Site?

Our Working on Country Team has now relocated to the site and taken over property maintenance. The gardens are being transformed into a bush tucker and food haven, ready to support the future café restaurant. A new flagpole has also been installed, proudly flying our very large flag. SETAC's Corporate Team has also moved onsite, with the upstairs fit-out to be completed first.

Timeline

The fit-out is scheduled to begin in the coming months, with completion expected between January and March 2026.

Free, confidential, trauma-informed support for Aboriginal people applying to the National Redress Scheme for survivors of institutional child sexual abuse.

We help with applications, connect you to legal and financial advice, and walk alongside you through the process.

Applications close 30 June 2027 – the process can take up to 12 months, so don't wait.

FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAM

Culturally safe support for at-risk families, linking to services, navigating child and youth systems, and promoting wellbeing and inclusion.

Empowering families and young people through health, culture, and education. Our team supports early childhood development, children's health, learning, and wellbeing, always with a strong sense of culture and belonging.

FOR MUMS, BUBS & LITTLE ONES (0–4)

Supporting families with referrals to health and community services, plus play-based activities that build social skills, curiosity, and cultural connection.

Programs:

 Mums & Bubs Group: Monthly play-based learning for children 0-4, while parents connect.

Rarryna Playgroup: Weekly sessions for 0–4 year olds to play, learn, and share experiences.



FOR KIDS & TEENS (4-18)

Helping Aboriginal children and youth thrive in school, stay connected to culture, and build wellbeing.

Programs:

- One-on-One Tutoring: Tailored learning support to help students reach their goals.
- Takariliya Wakata: School holiday program with physical challenges, cultural activities, and outdoor adventures.
- Family Engagement Nights: Coming soon!
 Fun, learning, and connection for the whole family.
- Parent Walking Groups: Gentle weekly exercise and a chance for parents to connect while supporting their children.



Our four-year program supports Aboriginal-led care for land, sea, and culture across southern Tasmania. Guided by community and partners, Rangers restore Country through fire management, wildlife protection, invasive species control, and heritage conservation. Planned hands-on activities, like guided walks, education programs, and cultural experiences, will share knowledge, support tourism, and create jobs. With more women and youth joining the team, Rangers are building practical skills to protect and celebrate Country now and into the future.


STUDENTS JOIN RANGERS FOR CULTURAL BURNS

Now in its third year, a five-year land regeneration program gives St James students hands-on experience caring for Country. This is their second year joining Indigenous Rangers for cultural burns, learning fire safety, responsible burning, and traditional land management.

Seeing the land firsthand, soils, crowded plants, and dry grasses, helps students understand the importance of controlled burns. Returning to watch the land regenerate and wildlife return brings their learning to life.

MEMBERS & CLIENTS

CLIENTS, MEMBERS, AND CONFIRMATION OF ABORIGINALITY AT SETAC

At the South East Tasmanian Aboriginal Corporation (SETAC), both our clients and members are important, but there are differences...

Category	Clients	Members
Access to Services	Can access all SETACs servcies	Can access all SETACs servcies
Governance Role	No governance role	Can vote, stand for the Board, and help guide SETAC's future
Age Requirement	No specific age requirement	Must be at least 15 years old
Residency Requirement	No specific residency requirement	Must live in Kingborough or Huon areas
Application Process	Must be registered with SETAC	Must apply in writing and be accepted by the Board

UPDATE ON CONFIRMATION OF ABORIGINALITY (COA)

A Confirmation of Aboriginality (COA) endorses an individual's claim that they are Aboriginal, so they can access services, programs, and opportunities that are for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people only.

SETAC's Board has given clear direction on COA:

We will provide COA to:

- Approved SETAC members
- Children of members, where a birth certificate or other document clearly shows the link We will not provide COA to:
 - Non-members or people outside the SETAC membership
 - Individuals who cannot show how they are connected to existing SETAC family groups
 - Anyone asking SETAC to research their ancestry, as finding and proving family history is each person's responsibility
 - Aboriginal people who come from the mainland. They will need to access this information from their community/tribe.

We know this is a sensitive issue. Thank you for your understanding as we continue to support our community with respect and integrity.
